## *Pastoral Ponderings*

On Palm Sunday 2020, we held our third Zoom worship service. Everything was new and tentative. The pandemic lockdown had disrupted life as we knew it. Fear of the unknown was energetic – it kept us awake at night and fueled spring-cleaning and home improvement projects left undone for years. The fear was powerful, but so was hope.

We hoped that this would be over soon. Church leaders hoped for a quick return to sanctuaries. Many anticipated delaying Easter celebrations by just a few weeks. Others thought it might be a Pentecost celebration which would see the congregation back together in-person. They were wrong about the timing, but they were right to hope. Faith, hope and love have seen us through the last year. Having endured this long, we continue to hope. We rejoice in the development of a vaccine arriving first to protect the oldest and most vulnerable among us. We rejoice as it is distributed to an ever-widening circle, and as we hear of trials for a child-safe version. We rejoice in the coming of spring, a reminder of the cycles of our lives and of the power of resurrection. I am encouraged by these words from Jan Richardson:

### **Rough Translations**

*Par' elpida ep' elpidi.* — Romans 4.18, Greek New Testament  
(Literally, "Against hope with hope.")

Hope nonetheless.  
Hope despite.  
Hope regardless.  
Hope still.

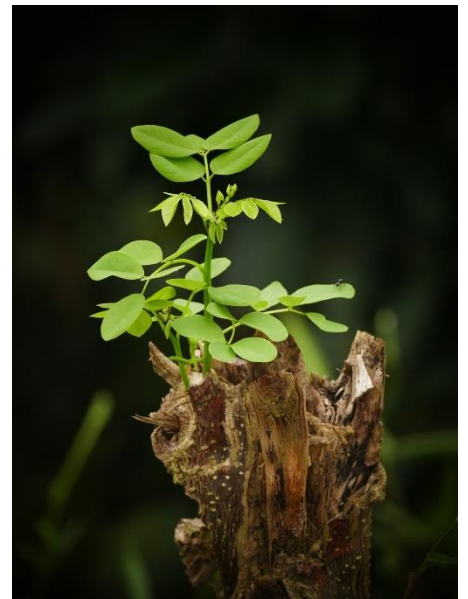
Hope where we had ceased to hope.

The Albany CROP Hunger Walk is scheduled for Sunday, May 2. Again this year, due to the pandemic, it will be a virtual event. Walkers can walk wherever they choose that afternoon or any other day that is convenient, to raise funds to help support Church World Services global hunger fighting programs and local food pantries and soup kitchens.

The need is especially great, given the continuing pandemic. 25% of funds raised are used for local hunger programs, and 75% for Church World Service programs throughout the world. Last year the Albany walk was 6<sup>th</sup> in the nation, raising just under \$91,000.

I have registered the Emmanuel team on the CROP Walk website. If you plan to walk, you can register for the walk online, and encourage supporters to donate online.

### **Position Available: Breakfast Program Coordinator**

FOCUS Churches of Albany is a nonprofit, faith based organization operating a food pantry and a breakfast program for individuals who are homeless and/or in need of food in downtown Albany.

FOCUS is seeking to fill the part time position of **Breakfast Program Coordinator**. The Coordinator's responsibility is to provide leadership and oversight of the program which provides hot breakfasts and bag lunches to as many as 140 individuals three days per week. The Coordinator will work with volunteers and staff to ensure the smooth operations of meal preparation and distribution (done by volunteers) and the safety and well-being of guests, volunteers and staff.

This position will require a range of 10-15 hours per week, (typically: Mondays 9:30am to 12 Noon; Tuesdays and Wednesdays 6:00am to 10:00am)

Supervisory experience is required. Experience in working with people who are low-income and food insecure is preferred. This is a great part-time position for someone who enjoys working in the mornings.

Compensation is \$18 to \$20 per hour, depending on experience.

Job Type: Part-time

COVID-19 considerations: We follow strict COVID-19 safety protocols to maintain safety and public health for all staff, guests and volunteers.

## FOCUS Anti-Racism Task Force

**Why:** Three years ago, the leadership of FOCUS began an intentional discernment of how to continue strengthening the bonds of our churches around common concerns and passions. Over the course of a year-long process concluding in 2019, four priorities were identified: food insecurity, immigration, housing, and anti-racism ministries. Already invested in food insecurity ministries, and having convened an immigration task force in 2019 that concluded its work, we are now launching an Anti-Racism Task Force. This launch was delayed a full year as all of our congregations refocused ministry during the pandemic.

**What:** The group will be made up of interested people from across our congregations, brought together for this purpose. Using resources that each of us are aware of, or investigate, the group will be asked to explore the ways in which FOCUS may take a new step in anti-racism ministry. Hearing from groups working in this area in our region, speaking to experts, and engaging in research together may be a part of the work.

**When:** The group will launch in June of this year. It will engage in learning together in the ways it decides are most relevant and helpful, in order to report back to the board in late 2021, or very early 2022. It is hoped the task force will offer recommendations on the next step(s) in our mutual exploration and work in anti-racism ministries for FOCUS.

**How to be involved:** The FOCUS Anti-Racism Task Force is now forming. An Administrator/Convener will be appointed by the Board at their May meeting. 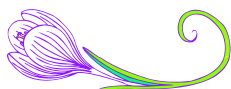
